When moving heavy machinery like the 1030 and 1230 trenchers, be aware of flying objects that might cause injury. Wear a hard hat and safety glasses to protect yourself. Also, watch out for hot parts that could burn you - let them cool down before touching anything. Prolonged exposure to loud noises can lead to hearing loss, so don't forget your ear protection! Be careful not to slip or trip, as this could result in injury. Remember, page 30. When lifting the machinery, only use the designated points marked by decals - lifting elsewhere might be unsafe and damage the equipment. The crushing weight of the trencher can cause serious harm, so make sure you're using the right procedures and gear, or simply stay away. Before you start lifting, double-check the specifications and ensure your hoist is strong enough to support the weight. To tie down the unit securely, attach tiedowns at the front and rear points marked by decals. When hauling the trencher, be mindful of the trailer's capacity - an incorrectly loaded machine might lead to a swaying trailer or even cause it to slip. To load the 1030 and 1230 trenchers safely: start the engine (refer to page for startup procedures), raise the digging boom but keep it low, and make sure the axle is locked before moving the unit. When unloading, release the tiedowns, open the fuel shut-off valves, start the engine, move the throttle to a quarter-open position, ensure the bail is engaged, and check that the speed/direction control is in neutral. If you must move the trencher without running the engine, use the free-wheel feature - but be cautious of the crushing weight. Under normal conditions, towing the unit should not be necessary; however, if it becomes disabled and needs to be towed, do so at a slow pace (less than 1 mph) for short distances (not exceeding 100') and avoid towing altogether. For daily operation, perform a thorough inspection of the tractor and digging attachment before each day's work, checking for loose or damaged parts, fluid leaks, and making any necessary adjustments to ensure safe and efficient use. Incorrect procedures may result in death, injury, or property damage. It's essential to follow instructions for new engine break-in and learn to use equipment correctly. **Emergency Shutdown:** In the event of an emergency, turn off the power switch immediately. **Important Notices:** * If the interlock system does not function, contact your Ditch Witch dealer as improper repair might allow the machine to start or operate with controls in gear. * Do not wire or tape the bail to the handlebar or defeat the interlock system in any manner. **Operating Instructions:** * When driving on a slope, keep attachments low and drive slowly and cautiously at all times. * Ensure that speed/direction control is in the BAIL RELEASE (neutral) position before starting operations. **Trenching Operations:** 1. Drive the trencher to the starting point and move it in line with the planned trench. 2. Lock the axle for a straighter trench, then move the throttle to half open. 3. Ensure that speed/direction control and digging chain control are in neutral before proceeding. **Trenching Operation Steps:** 1. Slowly lower the digging boom to the desired trench depth. 2. When the trench is complete, move the speed direction control to neutral, then move the throttle to half open. 3. Raise the digging boom to the top of the trench and release the bail to stop the digging chain. 4. Engage the bail and raise the digging boom completely. **Lubrication and Maintenance:** * Proper lubrication and maintenance protect Ditch Witch equipment from damage and failure. * Use only recommended lubricants, fill to capacities listed in specifications, and check oil levels every 50 hours. * Change gearbox oil every 1000 hours with the corresponding replacement. **Lubrication Schedule:** * Check engine oil each time it's used. * Perform other maintenance tasks according to the specified intervals. Check hydraulic oil every 25 hours, lube pivot stub every 10 hours. Lube trail wheel every 25 hours, axle lock every 50 hours. Check pivot gearbox oil every 50 hours, change engine oil every 100 hours with GEO. With fully raised digging boom, check hydraulic oil at dipstick before each operation and add THF as necessary. Lube lube attachment every 10 hours, check pivot every 25 hours. Lube pivot (B) every 10 hours, axle lock every 25 hours. Check gearbox oil every 50 hours with fill plug, change engine oil every 1000 hours with THF. Check worm drive oil every 50 hours at fill plug, refill with AGMA-7 as necessary. Change worm drive oil every 500 hours. Adjust digging chain tension and lube boom stub every 50 hours with MPG. Specifications for the 1030 and 1230 trenchers include maximum trench depth of 30 inches and 36 inches respectively, with a width of 4.3-6 inches in both models. The boom travel angles are 60° down and 47° up, while the headshaft height is 8.6 inches. The vehicles have a maximum transit forward speed, with the 1030 reaching 3400 rpm and the 1230 reaching 3600 rpm. The flywheel power at full load is 10.2 hp for the 1030 and 12 hp for the 1230. Fuel consumption is approximately .89 gallons per hour, and the maximum tilt angle is 20° for both models.
